

Reflections

"My advice for the storm:

draw close to something rooted, whose summoning song beckons with vocation –

like an oak trunk, wrung from contortions of coping which yet baffles the wind."

So writes the Bishop of Ramsbury, Andrew Rumsey, in the epigraph of his book of reflections 'English Pastoral.' Here is good advice in the face of storms, physical or spiritual: be rooted in something strong, something that has worn storms pasts, and while shaped by them, has stood, and survived ever stronger - just like the warped and contorted, and yet utterly beautiful and dignified trunk of an ancient oak.

It's spiritual equivalent is infinitely stronger, it is Jesus Christ the Lord, in whose love and name we trust. And, if we are grounded in him, then, while the storms inevitably change and contort us, we will not only come through, but like the goodly old oak tree, we will be enriched, all the more dignified and beautified, not only for our survival, but for our rootedness in the Triune majesty of the eternal God.

And how can we be sure to be rooted in the mighty Tree of Life which is God's love - by lives surely, dutifully, and faithfully lived, lives grounded in regular and deep worship, in regular and deep study of the scriptures, and in regular, deep and committed lives of prayer - all three of which move us beyond words and intercessory lists, to a deep connection with the divine word. And, the more we give, the more we will be able to understand, the more we are able to hear His call and will for us, and thus our roots will be deeper, and our tenacity stronger in the face of the spiritual storms that Satan inevitably drives towards us.



And thus, at this time, we find ourselves at the gates of that great season of penitence, prayer, and reflection, Lent. That time when we acknowledge our mortality, and the dust from which are hewn, and to which our flesh shall one day return. What greater time to reflect upon our roots, and our inner knowledge of the divine, than to use these holy and solemn days to look within ourselves, and nurture our own beings with the wholesome water of life that we find in the Christ child, as we move from the crib to the cross in these ashen days.

That great saint, comprehender of the inner life, and encourager of spiritual depth, St Teresa of Avila said,

"Each of us has a soul, but we forget to value it. We don't remember that we are creatures made in the image of God. We don't understand the great secrets hidden inside of us."

She also reminds that.

"Prayer is nothing more than spending a long time alone with the one I know loves me."

So, as January becomes February and Winter looks to Spring, as Christmastide departs and Lent unfurls, water your roots, nurture your depths, pause in prayer and wile away some time in silence and meditation, and let the voice of the infinite majesty, speak to you in your own inner being, that you might be enriched, strengthened, and perhaps even contorted, by the love and light and depth of the wonderous love of God.

Letter from Sam

Dear Friends,

Happy New Year! We've made it to 2024, and we can tell it's the start of a new year, because the temperature is rarely above 5 degrees. Neb and I are currently sat under 3 blankets in the Rectory Office.

January and February are, by most people's estimates, the dreariest months of the year. Christmas is over, New Year has been celebrated, but the weather remains intransigent. Perhaps it's appropriate that Easter — and therefore Lent — is so early this year. In a move which I'm certain would thrill St. Valentine, the Church has decided that in 2024 we shall mark romance by reminding people that they are but dust, and to dust they shall return. Take that, Hallmark cards.

Yet as a (very much fledgling) Bonsai hobbyist, I've been forced to embrace the cold weather of January and February more than in previous years. I've no doubt that those with greener fingers than I will roll their eyes at this basic knowledge, but it has taken me until 2024 to understand that trees of most varieties rely on winter for their survival. I had always assumed that trees simply endured the cold (much like I do,) but caring for my small Bonsai collection has taught me quite the opposite. It's during the winter that many trees enter a necessary period of dormancy, of rest and consolidation,



allowing new growth to become hard wood. Without this period, many trees would struggle, indeed might die. For nature in its beauty, constant acceleration is neither possible nor healthy.

Lent is a period in which the church bids us to 'slow down' (a lesson that clergy themselves might strive harder to hear, me included!) Before we enter the passion, energy, and excitement of the holiest week of the year, we take a few weeks to pray, reflect, and learn. The church building itself becomes more subdued, entering a sort of liturgical autumn, in which flowers disappear, beautiful surroundings are covered, and worship services lose the jollity of the Gloria and Alleluia Gospel procession.

Whilst we might be tempted to mourn this period of slow solemnity, seeing it as something to merely endure, rather than engage with; perhaps we could learn a lesson from nature. We, like trees, need time to rest. We need time to consolidate. We need time for freshly learned lessons to become the wisdom of our hearts, though time and reflection. If we are constantly rushing, can we ever truly be said to have developed? Or do we simply skim through life, on the outside a picture of development, but on the inside in need of pruning?

As Lent approaches, I encourage you to use it as the gift it is. Take the time you need to slow down to a stop. We've barely caught up after Christmas, Lent is the time to remember that we have weeks before we need to buy Easter Eggs, whatever the shelves of Tesco might tell us. Christ's Passion will be upon us, and to truly engage with it, we need time to get ready.

My Spiritual Director recently encouraged me to start praying the Examen prayer. I know many of you are familiar with it, but I shall share it for those who aren't.

- Begin by taking a moment of silence, centring yourself mentally and physically. Allow yourself to embrace the feeling of God's love, surrounding you.
- Go through your day, and pick the moment you most knew God's love, you were most able to express God's love. Pick the moment you'd most choose to relive, if you could.
- What made it special? How did God console you in that moment?

- Next, go through your day and pick the moment you least knew God's love, were least able to express God's love.
- What made the moment a struggle? Where was God in the struggle?
- Offer to God all your day, the good and the challenging. Know that he was there in all of it.

I've found the prayer an invaluable way of adding a pause into my day. Perhaps, especially this Lent, you can too. Let that be the start of allowing Lent to teach you to rest.

As always, this comes with my warmest blessings. Neb sends his regards too, snoozing gently under our blanket. (Truly he is an example to us all!)



Whatever you did for Christmas I hope you had a wonderful time. Christmas services at St John the Baptist were very well attended with over 300 people at the Crib service. And as always it was a great pleasure to welcome the local schools for their Christmas Carol Services. If you added up all the people who attended these services well over 1,500 people entered our church. Could it be a New Year wish is that people who came may decide that this church is for them and will come on a Sunday? We can only hope.

We said goodbye to Gary, our Musical Director who decided that St JB wasn't quite for him. The post has already been readvertised and within a few minutes of it going out on the internet we received a completed application along with several serious enquiries. As Gary left us so Jackie rejoined us a Verger and so we extend a very warm "welcome back" to her. One of the first items Jackie tackled was the restarting of the Toddler Group, so wish them every success under the new name of "Little Saints".

But what does 2024 hold for St JB. From the wardens' perspective there are no major projects to handle, although you



never know what might happen. The boiler has been completed, although one of the boilers suffered a major breakdown a few days before Christmas. This was classified by Valiant (the manufacturer) as an emergency and they attended on the Saturday, made extensive repairs and got it going. The other major project is the refurbishment and upgrade to our organ. Work on this will not start until towards the end of the year. Hopefully the new Director of music will be in place by March, so then we can start moving towards making St John the Baptist Church a centre of music excellence. But I have absolutely no doubt that there will be plenty to keep us occupied.

On behalf of myself, Bruce and Vivien may we wish everybody a very Happy and Peaceful New Year.

High Barnet Good Neighbour Scheme at 40. (HBGNS)

1984 was the year that saw the launch of the films Ghostbusters and Indiana Jones and the Temple of Doom . It was also the year that launched Band Aid and Do they Know it's Christmas and saw the start of the Miners' strike in the UK.

In Barnet, 1984 saw the start of the High Barnet Good
Neighbour Scheme. The idea was (and still is) to support people living at home by offering practical help, transport, advice and friendship. This support has included taking people shopping (or actually doing it), driving to hospital, doctor or dental appointments, collecting prescriptions, gardening and befriending, amongst other things.

In the past 40 years we estimate that our volunteers have made over 20,000 journeys for appointments etc and driven over 200,000 miles. We currently have over 200 neighbours who



we assist as and when necessary and estimate we have assisted over 6,000 neighbours over the past 40 years.

We plan to celebrate 40 years of Good Neighbours in Barnet this year so watch this space. In the meantime we will be holding a fundraising quiz night on Friday 15 March (seats available from the GNS office) and we will continue with our work helping neighbours in the EN5 area.







Where are they Now?

'I was curate in the Chipping Barnet Ministry Team from my ordination in 2003 till January 2007. I had always felt that my vocation was to hospital chaplaincy, and I obtained the post of Assistant Chaplain at Portsmouth Hospitals NHS Trust, starting in January 2007. After four months in post, I was promoted to Chaplain within the same Trust.

The Trust comprised three hospitals: Queen Alexandra's; St Mary's; and the Royal Hospital, Haslar. As Chaplain, I was expected to take on an area of responsibility, and mine was to look after the patients and staff in the Royal Hospital Haslar. During my time working for the Trust, the three hospitals consolidated on a single site: a much-enlarged hospital at Queen Alexandra's, so my area of responsibility changed to care of patients and staff in elderly



medicine. When I was appointed, there were seven full-time chaplains in the trust. Over the following 10 years, however, the number of chaplains reduced to just two full-time (of which I was one), and several part time (to help with emergency cover out-of-hours: chaplains were frequently called in when patients were near to death, or had had a miscarriage or still birth).

I loved my work, and found it deeply fulfilling to be alongside people in times of crisis or change, and to help support their families. It was also lovely to work with the nurses, doctors, and other staff in the hospital, and to support them when the going was tough, too. I retired from my role as chaplain in August 2017.

In chaplaincy posts, unlike Church appointments, accommodation is not provided, so David and I had bought our own home about 7 miles from the hospital. We love our home and its location, so decided not to move when I retired – David had retired from his post as chaplain at HABS before we moved down to Hampshire.

There is a shortage of clergy in parishes in the Portsmouth Diocese, so retired clergy are much in demand, helping on

Sundays and mid-week for services of Holy Communion, and also to take some funerals. I had decided that I wanted to retire, when I finished working at the hospital, so I just help out occasionally, and

also take some Home Communions; but David is still quite active and takes many more services than I do.

Our family has increased since our Barnet days. We now have eight grandchildren, as well as our four children and their partners, all of whom still live in the UK, but not immediately close by, so we are glad to have time to see them when we can. We still return to Hertfordshire from time to time, and have not forgotten the many friends we made in Barnet during our three-and-a-bit years with you. We hope that you remember us, too!'


Divine Beauty by Night

Last year the four magnificent Pre- Raphaelite Burne-Jones windows in Birmingham Cathedral were cleaned and restored. This was an enormous task only to be undertaken by specialist conservers. The windows had withstood the years of grime and dirt of the Industrial Revolution of the 18th and 19th centuries.

Fearing damage during the



Second World War, the stained-glass windows were removed in 1939 and kept safe in a slate mine in Wales until they were returned almost ten years later.

The windos are now returned to their original positions and were the subject of a sell-out Son et Lumiere project which I was privileged to experience at the turn of the year. Images of the windows were projected on the walls and roof of the interior of the Cathedral and the effect was stunning. The Cathedral was bathed in bright light,

reminiscent of the kaleidoscopes we enjoyed as children. Music accompanied images of the Holy Family and the Apostles during the fifteen minute presentation. It was a moving experience to watch and also to observe others; some sat on seats or on the floor to enhance their experience. My visit has given me much to reflect upon for some time.



AN EVENING PILGRIMAGE TO ST ALBANS ABBEY

On 21st November 2023, a few of us from St John the Baptist's were privileged to join others from the Barnet Deanery for an evening of exploration, meditation, and prayer in the empty, half-lit abbey. Over almost two hours we were led to the choir, high altar, lady chapel, nave, shrine of St Alban, then back to the choir for Compline. In the nave we were shown by special lighting how the medieval frescoes on the pillars would have looked when they were freshly painted. Behind the altar in the nave, the badly worn medieval statues in the niches of the nave screen have been replaced by seven new statues, put there in 2015. They are carved in stone and painted in appropriate colours, as the original ones would have been. The central figure is St Alban, and he is flanked by ecumenical figures including an Orthodox nun, a Jesuit priest, and the Lutheran Dietrich Bonhoeffer who is standing on a crushed swastika. His inclusion reminded me of the contact we had with the Ecumenical Church of the Rhineland through the LEP, and

the gift to the abbey from a church in Cologne of a much-venerated relic - St Alban's shoulder blade - that is now under the canopy in the Shrine. It was a wonderful evening. We were grateful to our knowledgeable and patient guides. Jenny Remfry
